



A WORD FROM THE CHAIR



This year's annual report is more than a summary of the year's activities, it is a time to reflect on the various "growth" moments that are guiding our efforts over the past year. "Growth" moments are spaces and places where we learn together as NCHC continues to serve our community.

During this past year, the Board of Directors has understood the importance of leaving a strong legacy for future Boards. Specifically, having a good working knowledge of our By-

Laws is important legacy work as we begin to work on Board Policies. This work is also vital as we set Board Governance within the NCHC Principles.

The Board of Directors has also come to understand that relationships and clear lines of communication are important in supporting healthy relationships with Partners, the Executive director, the Medical Director, and Members. Based on the recommendations of a consultant working with the Board, the Board has introduced lines of communication, included the Medical Director as a Board member and began work on our Board Policies and Strategic Plan. We have 16 individuals who have come forward to volunteer their time to develop a strategic plan for the NCHC.

The Board has also embarked on activities to support our Charitable Status application. This application is vital for future short-term and long-term funding-raising activities. The Board has also worked on organizing an onboarding process for Board Members and improving the Member and Board membership application process. With the ending of Astrid Velasquez's secondment to the NCHC, the Board was successful in securing Astrid Velasquez as the Executive Director. The Board also looks forward to possibly adding three new Board members as the nomination committee works on their applications.

Last but not the least, the most important "growth" moment comes regarding the Finances of the NCHC. As a result of meetings between the Executive Director and the Medical Director, the Medical Director has agreed that there are no discrepancies with the NCHC Finances. With that said, working with the accountant to streamline Financial Statements continues. Within all these moments the NCHC Principles continue to echo their importance as we move forward and ground our service to the community through a Principles-based approach.

The Board of Directors would like to thank and acknowledge the efforts of all, as we learn to work collectively. As we anticipate future "growth" moments we know that our responses require imagining an innovative and creative way forward, but most of all it requires an intentionality.
